PERFECT BALANCE BETWEEN NATURE AND URBAN LIFE

The Outaouais, a region where nature intertwines with urban life, delights visitors with its many experiences and warm hospitality. Nestled along the border with Ontario and just steps from Canada's capital, Ottawa, the Outaouais offers a perfect blend of natural beauty and cultural vibrancy, an ideal setting for relaxation and discovery. Its rich history is reflected in its picturesque towns and villages, while its proximity to the Ottawa River and the boreal forest invites you to discover unspoiled natural spaces. The Outaouais is a region where everyone can enjoy a unique and memorable experience.



History

Understanding the history of a place allows you to fully appreciate its uniqueness. We invite you to look beyond the region's tourist attractions to better understand who we are and what we have to offer.

FIRST NATIONS

First Nations, notably the Anicinapek (Anishinabeg) and Kanien'kehá:ka (Mohawks), were essential partners in the fur trade. Europeans learned survival, trapping and hide-tanning techniques from these people, already established in western Quebec. Nomadic, the Anicinapek moved seasonally between their hunting territories and gathering places.

The Anicinapek formed alliances with the French, facilitating exploration and trade along the Ottawa River. Their knowledge of the territory was fundamental for the coureur des bois, who used traditional First Nations' water routes for the fur trade.

17-19th Century THE FUR TRADE

The fur trade marked western Quebec with the exploitation of beavers. The Coureurs des bois, often of French origin, learned First Nations techniques and established trading posts along the Ottawa River, a major route until the end of the 19th Century.

19-20th Century THE FORESTRY

Following Napoleon's blockage in the 19th Century, England turned to its colonies for timber. Entrepreneurs such as Philemon Wright founded towns around the logging industry, which stretched from the Laurentians to Abitibi-Témiscamingue, fostering the growth of the sawmill and pulp and paper industries, and of trades such as log driving.

19-20th Century THE COLONIZATION

Colonization began in the Outaouais region under the British rule, driven by the demand for timber. In the Laurentians, Father Antoine Labelle promoted the settlement of colonists to counter emigration. In Abitibi, the construction of the railroad facilitated the establishment of farming communities and fostered economic growth.

1920's-1930's THE GOLD RUSH

The discovery of gold at Osisko Lake in 1921 sparked a mining rush, stimulating the growth of towns such as Rouyn, Noranda and Val-d'Or, in the Abitibi-Témiscamingue. Thousands of workers and adventurers quickly settled in the region, transforming its social and economic landscape.

1918–1927 LA PROHIBITION

Because of its proximity to Ontario, the Outaouais region was at the heart of activities related to Prohibition. Hull, nicknamed "Little Chicago", became a hub for illegal alcohol sales, leading to corruption and crime. Today, Hull is a district of Gatineau and a major administrative and cultural center.

is deeply connected to Canada's history. Carl Le Trappeur has been interested in wildlife since childhood and chose to make it a profession. He takes great pleasure in guiding you into the woods and reveal his secrets.

The word Outaouais means

"to buy and sell"

evoking a past of flourishing trade along the Ottawa River.

The Eska water is naturally filtered by

six eskers

on the Amos-Harricana territory and has been recognized as one of the purest waters in the world. Obadjiwan–Fort Témiscamingue National Historic Site is recognized today as one of the most important French-Canadian

fur trading posts,

having played a key role for nearly two centuries.

Gatineau's bike paths network spans over

300 km,

one of the most extensive in Quebec, making it easy to get around by bike all year round! Mont Tremblant: its name comes from the

Algonquins,

who called it "Manitonga Soutana", meaning "mountain of trembling spirits" inspired by local legends of spirits that would dwell there.

PARC NATIONAL DU MONT-TREMBLANT

Established in 1895, Parc national du Mont-Tremblant spans over 1,510 km², making it Quebec's first national park, the third in Canada, and the sixth in North America. Recognized internationally, it stands among the world's most iconic protected areas, alongside Yellowstone, Yosemite, and Sequoia. Open year-round, the park offers an exceptional natural playground in every season.

PARC NATIONAL D'OKA

The Parc national d'Oka boasts a rich historical and natural heritage. The Calvaire, with its four oratories and three chapels, is a unique complex of historic buildings in America. In Grande Baie and Rivière aux Serpents, land and water come together to give birth to ecological jewels: wetlands. MONTAGNE DU DIABLE REGIONAL PARK

This regional park is home to Mont Sir-Wilfred, the second highest mountain in the Laurentians after Mont-Tremblant. There are over 80 km of hiking trails. The park is packed with attractions, including the famous 55-metre Windigo Fall and breathtaking panoramic views.

KIAMIKA REGIONAL PARK

The Kiamika Regional Park is a vast territory of 184 sq.km composed of 40 islands and islets bordered by golden sandy shores. In the heart of the park, there is a biodiversity reserve with trees over 200 years old. It's the perfect place for camping, canoe-camping, hiking, fishing, kayaking and paddleboarding.

PARC NATIONAL D'AIGUEBELLE

A true natural jewel of the Abitibi-Témiscamingue region, Parc national d'Aiguebelle is home to a variety of geological phenomenon with evocative names: giant's kettle, pillow lava. A 22-metre-high suspended walkway offers a thrilling crossing over a gigantic fault. Come and observe the traces left by the passage of icebergs and rocks 2.7 billion years old. Don't be surprised if you come across moose, as this territory is home to the largest concentration of this species of deer in the Abitibi region. Plus, take advantage of the many available accommodations: campgrounds, wilderness cabins and ready-to-camp campsites throughout the seasons.

PARC NATIONAL D'OPÉMICAN

Bordered on either side by Lac Témiscamingue and Lac Kipawa, Parc national d'Opémican covers an area of 252 sq.km. A paradise for nautical activities, canoe-camping and hiking, this unique place to be discovered is characterized by the dominant presence of tall white and red pines, this park has elements essential to the composition of a remarkable landscape and a total escape into nature. 


GATINEAU PARK




FORÊT RÉCRÉATIVE



REFUGE PAGEAU

The Pageau family story spans over 30 years and reflects their incredible relationship with wildlife and is told on a woodland trail. The Refuge takes in orphaned, sick or injured wild animals to care for them and, when possible, release them back into the wild. You'll be able to admire moose, bears, wolves, white-tailed deer, raccoons, birds of prey and many other animals staying here on a short or long-term basis. At the end of the tour, in an immersive experience signed Moment Factory, visit the lair of the man who talked to the wolves and discover your role in maintaining the fragile balance between humans and nature.

History and heritage

THE LAURENTIAN SKI MUSEUM

The museum offers exhibitions and a variety of educational and cultural experiences. It holds a collection of over 7,500 artifacts and 20 private archives. The permanent exhibition "The History of Skiing in the Laurentians: Living in winter, with winter and for winter" takes visitors on a journey back in time to better understand the influence of skiing on the Laurentian landscape.


MAGASIN GÉNÉRAL DUMULON

POW WOW TRAIL & EVENTS

Several major First Nations cultural festivals are held in the Abitibi-Témiscamingue communities. Pow Wows consists in celebrations featuring sacred ceremonies, demonstrations of traditional dances, sometimes competitions, and often ancestral songs and drums.






CARL BLONDIN

Carl Blondin is a true nature enthusiast. Fascinated by wild animals since childhood, he has been trapping for over twenty years. What began as a hobby has evolved into a profession. After a serious work-related accident in 1997, he realized the frailty of life and devoted himself fully to what he loves.

Since then, he has enjoyed explaining his work as a trapper and promoting his field of expertise. Much in demand by European tourists, he organizes trapping and observation excursions and gives lectures in schools. Carl is also available to capture pests and other nuisance animals, and is actively involved in wildlife population control, a mission he cherishes.

DOMINIQUE RANKIN

Grandfather T8aminik (the Algonquin name for Dominique) was born in the Abitibi forests and grew up in a family that had preserved the nomadic lifestyle of its ancestors. Designated at the age of 7 as the future heir chief, he underwent a long apprenticeship with elders and guides, including William Commanda, to become a medicine man and spiritual leader. In 2006, he was recognized as an elder by his peers. His real name is Kapiteotak ("the one who can be heard crying from afar"), and he now devotes himself to the role of teacher and spiritual leader to which he was destined.

A survivor of the terrible residential school era, he gives a moving account of forgiveness and reconciliation in "On nous appelait les Sauvages", written with Marie-Josée Tardif. A member of the Order of Canada and Chevalier de l'Ordre national du Québec, he works to promote First Nations culture worldwide. With Marie-Josée Tardif, he also founded the Kina8at organization and the Dominique Rankin Foundation.

Félix is now General Manager of Refuge Pageau. Supported by a small, close-knit team of passionate and committed individuals, every year hundreds of wild animals are cared for in the refuge's facilities. There is no doubt that the Refuge Pageau is the most ethical place in Quebec to observe local wildlife, except in the wild.

All the animals on site are there first and foremost for their own needs; no star residents kept for public enjoyment, no bargaining with the lives that pass through the hands of the team. While it also serves as a place of education and wonder for visitors, on which most of the organization's funding relies, it is first and foremost a bulwark for the well-being of wild animals and the safeguarding of biodiversity.

Born and raised in an immigrant family in Vieux-Hull, Gatineau, the family values instilled in Manuela from an early age undoubtedly contribute to Square Old Chelsea's success and visitor happiness index.

Karl is a true soul and proud of his colors. His deepest wish is that his work, his artworks and his teachings, may serve as a beacon for those who are also following the path of healing.

In addition to offering conferences and workshops promoting self-empowerment, Karl opens the door of his studio to all those seeking to learn: "I can only plant a seed; it will be up to them to take care of it and make it blossom."


